


To live out the integral mission of the Church in partnership with Christians around the world by:

# Regions of Ministry



## Fight against human trafficking with Nepalese women

Through attending life education classes, women living in a mountain area of Makawanpur, Nepal, gather together to teach villagers how to take precaution against human trafficking and they even saved a 14-year old teenager from a trafficker.



## Take initiative to stop harmful tradition in Ethiopia

Yemisirach is just married. Her mother-in-law accepts that she has not undergone the female genital mutilation procedure. "Through teachings from church and other community education activities, we learn and understand the harm of traditional female genital mutilation. Therefore we fully support the decision of our son and daughter-in-law."



### **Ethnic minority in Northern Thailand gets feed from the land**

Although Palaung, an ethnic minority tribe living in Northern Thailand, does not own any farmland, they are able to make use of the little land behind their houses to grow vegetables and raise catfish or pigs for a self-sufficient life.



### **Finally young rag-pickers living in the slums in India can attend school**

11-year old Nadeem went to classes organised by the children activity center in the slum area of India to learn simple vocabulary. He was later admitted to a government school through the help of CEDAR's partner. "I am so happy to see that he can read road signs and the route number of buses now," said his father.



### **Survivors of Nepal earthquake can live with a peace in mind**

The 4.25 earthquake and numerous aftershocks have made Nepalese girl Kamala worried and frightened everyday. Her heart was finally settled down when she received sheets of zinc to build a temporary accommodation. "I now feel safe, at ease and comfortable living with my family in this little hut," said Kamala.



### **Church of Bangladesh puts learning into action**



# Ministry Highlight

## Focusing, Deepening and Capacity Building

### ► Bangladesh



In Dhaka, the capital city of Bangladesh, there are a lot of families living in slums, where the hygiene and security situations are way sub-standard, and there is high tension in the society that threatens stability. In the past year, CEDAR's partner SATHI (World Renew Community Development Programme) promoted child rights in the slums to address one of the deeper needs of the society.

In this Muslim community, there are a number of Hindu of the lower castes. A number of them (and their future generations) are restricted and confined by the deep-rooted cultural norms to work in handling corpses only. A significant number of children are deprived of the right to education, protection and receive proper care because of child marriage and child labour. SATHI explains to the parents concerning the negative impact caused by these practices. This helps to safeguard the rights of the children, and teach them their worth early so that they may live out a dignified life.

Our other partner Tearfund Bangladesh focused on promoting Umoja church and community training projects. With the guidance of the Spirit, the church was encouraged to pay more attention to the needs of the communities, and to take up the role of leading the community to become more unified and working together. The project starts with bible-reading to reinforce their daily habit of

reading the Bible, then encourages them to live a life taught in the Bible, and to care for the community both individually and collectively, and to promote community development at their level.

### **Looking forward...**

Our partner SATHI has served the slums in Bouniabadh in Dhaka for 10 years. We are pleased that through the operation of 87 dwellers' groups and organisations, the residents have learnt to help each other and dissolved the gender inequality enrooted in popular religion and cultural beliefs. In the past year, our partner was gradually retreating from their project sites and it is hoped that these developed resident groups can take up the role of overseeing social development, and continue to improve the living conditions in the slums, so that residents can continue to enjoy a living condition that is sustainable.

In the last year, CEDAR also started to support the Salvation Army in Bangladesh, through them assistance was given to the sexual workers and female victims of human trafficking so they can start a new job and be admitted into the society. The Salvation Army in Bangladesh also shared this need with many local pastors and Christian leaders, hopefully bringing more people to pay attention to these groups, and to fully accept them starting from the church.

### **► China**



In the past 15 years, CEDAR sent colleagues to Hubei, Yunnan, and Gansu to implement various development projects. In these years, we realised that women played an important role in community development. This is because

women and men concern different needs and thus prioritised differently in community development. In Yunxi Hubei, the agricultural communities were our focus last year. Our project staff promoted women development in Yunxi, including organising female groups, listening to their opinions in village development and encouraging them to organise social events. This allows them to have the chance to learn from and exchange their views with each other on matters such as social activities, crafting, child-rearing, and relationships with the opposite sex. Through these interactions, women can build up their confidence and abilities, and become an important member in community development.

Water system and rendering support to the extreme poor groups were the main tasks in Yunxi. Our CEDAR staff in Hubei have accumulated over 10 years of experiencing in constructing water system. During the different stages of pipe construction, villagers have shown a high spirit of cooperation. This has set the foundation for their self-reliance in future.

In the last year Yunnan and Sichuan continued to focus on equipping local churches, schools and organisations with knowledge and supporting network to fight against different social issues such as HIV/AIDS. They organised different community training and workshops for front-line workers. CEDAR Yunnan team also motivated the local churches and voluntary organisations to serve the migrant communities living along the border between Myanmar and Yunnan.

### **Our wish...**

The development project in Yunxi will complete in early 2016. We hope the villagers will then learn to show love towards each other, to protect and to encourage the continuous development of their local communities. Our Gangsu project closed in 2014, and our Hubei project will also be completed in 2016. In the future, CEDAR will focus in Yunnan and Sichuan, training the local churches and organisations and building up their ability to care for their communities and the poor.

## ► Ethiopia



Ethiopia is a relatively fast-developing non oil-producing African country. She met the Millennium Development Goals set by the United Nations in 2000 – reduce children mortality by two-thirds, provide her people with clean water and basic sanitary supplies, promote gender equality, and also combat against AIDS and malaria. However, the continuous drought has resulted in a shortage of food there.

In the past 20 years, through AAGC (Addis Ababa Geunet Church) CEDAR has helped 559 poor children and their families, mainly to provide support for their daily lives. A number of kids have completed schooling in universities, and some benefited from the vocational training provided by AAGC. In January 2015, we conducted a review with AAGC to reflect how God has changed the lives of these children and their parents, through our partner's work in education, support, and parents' self-help groups.

In addition, CEDAR's another partner EKHC-DC (Ethiopia Kale Heywet Church Development Commission) has brought awareness to the harm caused by female genital mutilation (FGM) to over 40,000 people, through a number of campaigns and educational activities.

### **Our hope...**

In the next few years, AAGC hopes that she can continue to provide basic medical check-up for children, and more education support. At the same time, it is hoped that more graduates can provide help to other children. Furthermore,

our partner plans to provide vocational training for parents' self-help groups, in order to increase their work performance and provide employment opportunity.

Our other partner EKHC-DC also hopes to raise awareness of FGM among mothers, to reduce the harm induced to their daughters. At the same time, it is hoped that the projects can be expanded to cover other harmful traditional practices, further minimizing the negative impact on those vulnerable children.



## ► Myanmar

Myanmar was underdeveloped in the past decades and thus was spared from many environmental damages such as pollution. The natural habitat is still well preserved. Even in the biggest city Yangon, there is still an abundance of green zones. CEDAR is pleased to see that the Burmese government is now more opened to sign peace deals with over 10 of the armed insurgents. To the Burmese, peace is their top common wish after decades of civil wars. CEDAR partners Fullmoon and Hope Children Home continue to take care of the children and orphans affected by the wars, giving proper care and education so that the children may then serve their own communities after grown up.

As the wars have ceased in many regions, many families scattered by war have now returned to their homeland. Our partner Fullmoon has helped to rebuild the communities in Mon State by providing proper education, teaching sustainable farming techniques to the inhabitants, and preserving the natural habitat and resources. They also plan to begin a similar project to rebuild the communities in Karen State.

Our partner in Myanmar MFDC (Myanmar Family Development Company) believes that, sustainable agricultural development will be the key element in post-war Myanmar. Therefore, they are actively providing agricultural training in Mon State, Kayin State and the Delta area. Our partner hopes that by increasing the agricultural knowledge of farmers in poor region, they can improve their livelihoods.

### **Our expectation...**

In the long run, CEDAR and her partners hope to assist the local communities to develop local and foreign agricultural trade, in order to create a sustainable development opportunity for local economies. However, besides rebuilding the infrastructure and livelihood, there is still need to heal the damaged relationships from decades of hostility and injuries in the post-war regions. In the second half of 2015, a number of church leaders from different minority ethnic groups gathered to discuss how to achieve reconciliation in churches and also in the local communities. May the Lord strengthen the churches in Myanmar, so that they may become the herald of peace and bring true reconciliation to the injured communities in Myanmar.

### **► Nepal**



Since the 7.9 Richter scale quake on 25 April, there have been small earthquakes in Nepal continuously. But when the after-quakes had almost halted, the Nepalese government set up new constitution, which indirectly affected the post-quake relief works. Some disaster-struck areas became bargaining chips of political parties, and the approval for relief work has been delayed. Further,

because the Indian government is displeased with the new constitution, the border is shut and the export of goods to Nepal is restricted, causing a shortage of material for rescue and rebuilding.

The focus of CEDAR's partner is those areas struck by the 25 April disaster. Since the disaster, our partners immediately commenced relief effort and planned for the rebuilding afterwards. We praise the Lord that the local churches and Christian organisations have been actively responding to the needs of the quake survivors. CEDAR hopes that with the help of Christian organisations' networks, and the aids from local churches, CEDAR can reach the remote, small and easily overlooked villages to provide help. Some of these villages have never received support since the earthquake. Further, CEDAR cares much about the education in Nepal and is grateful for the trust of a number of people working in the HK's education sector, and their donation will be used towards the disaster-struck schools. Their generous gift will greatly facilitate the reconstruction of schools and also improve the conditions of many other schools.

### **Our plan...**

One massive disaster erased the fruits of many years of development in the community. Both the villagers, and the front-line workers of our partners feel disappointed and discouraged. However, disasters have also exposed the weakness in Nepal, so that we can respond more strategically. Human trafficking is a continual problem in Nepal, and it has become more serious since the earthquake. Our partner Share and Care Nepal is now raising the awareness and advising on preventive measures against human trafficking. Besides prevention, CEDAR is approaching the local anti-human-trafficking organisations to seek opportunities to cooperate, and to combat human trafficking collaboratively from different angles.

## ► Zimbabwe



People of Zimbabwe have been subject to dictatorship for many years. The current president Mugabe has been in office for over 30 years. The people are affected not only by human factor but also by natural disaster. The rainfall between November 2014 and March 2015 was much less than that of previous years, causing poor crops yield. Although there are still supplies stored from previous years, the poor rainfall will have an impact on future yields. Some villagers now have to pick fruits grown in the wild to survive.

CEDAR partner FACT (Family AIDS Caring Trust) works with over 16 local churches to help the orphans from AIDS families. The “Buddy” Project has paired 50 children from HIV/AIDS families with 50 children suffering from HIV/AIDS so they can support each other. FACT also teaches Bible to their beneficiary children to equip them to be future church leaders. Further, FACT also teaches the grandmothers of these children on how to save money and manage a small business through grandmother-saving groups.

The other CEDAR partner Trinity (Trinity Project Trust) actively helps the orphans and disadvantaged children to return to school and to protect their rights. Many poor families cannot afford the registration fee of their child, and cannot pay the fee to travel from their homes to the government registration offices. As a result, many children lost their rights to education and health protection. Orphans who have lost their parents to HIV/AIDS do not even have the right to inherit their parents' properties. In the past years, Trinity has worked with local churches to teach the citizens their rights and obligations, and to assist those who are married in churches to register their marriage. This will allow their children to register their births and receive basic life support.

## **We pray...**

Our partner FACT prays that those who were benefited from the children programmes will come back after grown up to help the other children. Trinity has expanded into the agricultural areas, and provided support to drought-struck families together with the local churches.

## **Mobilising churches and believers**

### **► Walking with churches**



CEDAR actively promoted Global Discipleship Programme in the last 2 years to HK churches, hoping to raise their sensitivity of world issues and also to challenge their Christian world view through exposure to various global issues and experiencing the unique situations in impoverished countries. A triangular partnership is formed between the church, our frontline partner and CEDAR. It's through this collaborative and complementary partnership that people see the living out of God's Kingdom in our world.

We are thankful for the trust and participation of Tsung Tsin Mission of Hong Kong Whampoa Church and Mongkok Baptist Church. They designed and executed with us a tailored-made Global Discipleship Programme that suit their own needs and wants. Members of these churches went separately to Ethiopia and Yunnan, to visit CEDAR's frontline partners. They visited the impoverished communities and families in these 2 countries and explored how they can work closer with CEDAR in providing better support and development. It is hoped that the churches will experience the grace of God in such interactions.

Looking ahead, we hope our last 2-year experience with these 2 churches can help us to identify more possibilities in our partnership with the Hong Kong churches. Through experimenting with and experiencing various cooperation models, it is hoped that more can be done for the poor and to serve justice. We are certain that God's work can be witnessed in the brokenness we see in the lives of the poor.

### ► Walking with Christians



In the last year, CEDAR Club continued to share issues related to poverty areas through monthly gatherings. We listened to the different cries, and remembered the needs of those who are under the threat of being marginalised. We had the following activities in the last year:

- The sharing by CEDAR's staff Paulina Ng concerning her experience in helping the poor in Hubei.
- The sharing of the documentary BANANAS! and the invitation of Mr. Anthony Chiu for a talk on injustice caused by unequal trades.
- The discussion on Retirement Protection in HK with Dr. Chiu Wai Sang, Professor in the Department of Social Work of HKBU.
- Visiting the organisation "SoIL", to learn about their beliefs and to reflect upon the meaning of land to us.
- A talk by Ms. Linda Wong Sau Yung, the Chief Executive of "Association Concerning Sexual Violence Against Women", for us to learn how sexual violence can injure the mind and body of the female victims, and to learn how to walk with them.

- Movie sharing of “Fish Story”, to learn about the situation of students in primary school.
- Dr. Christopher Fung, CEDAR’s environment consultant, shared his views about the teachings on God’s creation and protection as seen in the Bible and through the Church history.
- Mr. Leung Pak Kin, the Director of Ministry Development in Breakthrough, shared how to reach out to others through today’s media.
- Mr. Benson Tsang, the initiator of Equal Share Movement, shared his visions and practical experience.

## Networking

### ► Building collaborations with schools



In the last year, CEDAR continued to partner with Ying Wa Girls' School, and through the sharing of various global issues and local cross-cultural activities, their students' horizons were broadened and they became more acutely aware of the needs of our world.

Furthermore, through teaching courses and experiences, CEDAR encouraged students in other schools to rethink the relationship between the Christian faith and the poor world. CEDAR hopes that, through sharing and experiencing, the students can acquire a Christian world view, embrace how our Lord Jesus Christ expressed His love to the poor, and will then commit to build a just and compassionate world.

## ► International collaborations



The unrest situations in Syria and Iraq and consequently the civil wars have torn these countries for years. The living condition continues to worsen, and refugees flee from the countries every day. The number of refugees have unfortunately reached a new record this year, at over 60 million. CEDAR is a member of Integral Alliance (IA), and through other IA members, CEDAR provided daily necessities and medicine to the refugees, and provided psychological consultation as well. We also supported IA members to implement winter relief, deliver warm clothes, provide construction materials to the refugees. IA members also paid visits to some of the refugees. There are also children clubs and fellowship for the displaced children to heal their wounds caused by the war.

Last but not least, we also worked with other international agencies to help those affected by the typhoons in Vanuatu and the Philippines, and the earthquake in Nepal. We will continue to work closely with these partners so to respond efficiently to the needs of the disaster victims.

# Conclusion & Way Forward

CEDAR Strategic Plan for 2010-2014 ended in this year. In the past five years, CEDAR focused on the poverty situation and needs in Ethiopia, Zimbabwe, Bangladesh, Nepal, Myanmar and China, enhancing the partnership with the local churches and Christian organisations in these countries, and supporting them in realizing more comprehensive and advanced development projects, seeing transformation of lives and communities.

We witness God's grace among our partnerships in China, Myanmar and Nepal, through them the needs of those victims of human trafficking are responded to. Through our partners in Ethiopia, Bangladesh and India, we have served those living in the slums. Through our partners in Myanmar we supported post-war development, and have rendered care to some orphans and children who were affected by natural disaster and war. We supported the works of our partners in Zimbabwe, Nepal and India, to voice out the needs of the disadvantaged and oppressed, thereby protecting their basic rights and standard of living. In order to effectively respond to damages caused by natural disasters, we continue to be a member of Integral Alliance (a network of Christian relief and development organisations around the world) so with a collective effort, immediate relief can be provided followed by post-disaster relief and recovery.

There are too many things we need to thank God for. Looking ahead, we pray that we will continue to work closely with local and overseas churches and partners to attend to more needs of the poor. We pray that we can restore the relationship between men and men, between men and their society, between men and the environment, and most importantly between men and God. We pray that the lives of these communities in poverty will be transformed, and that we build a just and loving world in Christ. We will plan our work for 2016-2020 in early 2016, and may our gracious Lord guide us as He guided us in the last 5 years.




