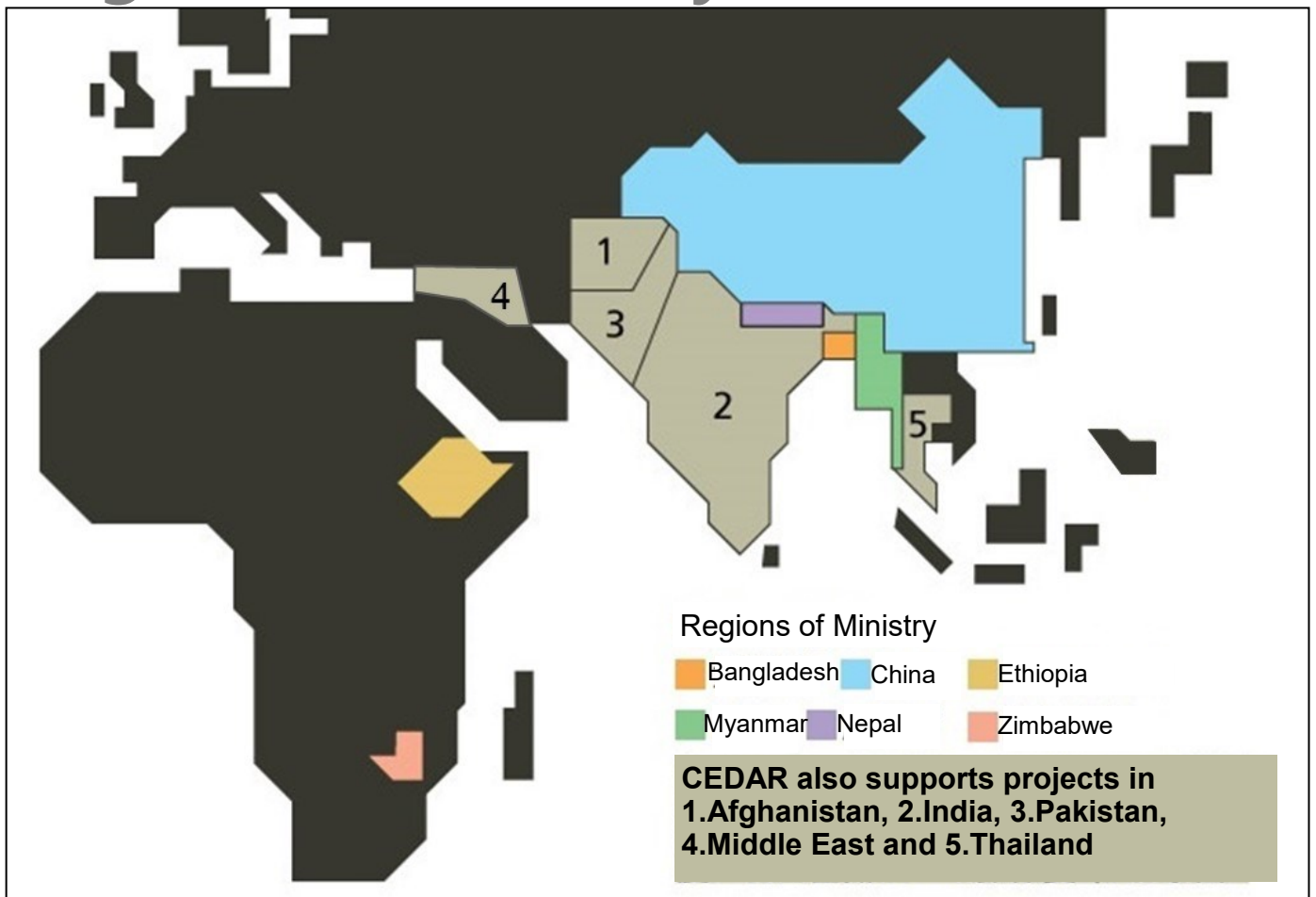

Project Reports

Overseas Ministry



According to the Trafficking Victims Protection Act, Human Trafficking is:

- >Sex trafficking: the recruitment, harboring, transportation, provision, or obtaining of a person for the purpose of a commercial sex act, in which the commercial sex act is induced by force, fraud, or coercion. or in which the person induced to perform such act has not attained 18 years of age; and
- >Labor Trafficking: the recruitment, harboring, transportation, provision, or obtaining of a person for labor or services, through the use of force, fraud, or coercion for the purpose of subjection to involuntary servitude, peonage, debt bondage, or slavery.

Human trafficking has become the second largest illegal trade sector in the world with 60% of the trades being international. According to the 3rd Global Slavery Index published in 5/31/2016, the number of people living in slave-like conditions was estimated to be 46,000,000.

Repairing lives

The Lord has guided us through each corner and led us to expand our work in Asia through partnerships with multiple organizations, who directed our support to the victims or the ones vulnerable to human trafficking through educating, rescuing, and counselling.

Sumaya was a girl from Bangladesh who got separated with her parents and was void of love and care since she was young. At the age of 15, she was betrayed by her friends and was sold to a brothel for under one thousand HKD. She was locked up for 4 months and was forced to meet over 10 customers per day. One of the customers redeemed her down the road but her mother refused to take her in, and she was forced to become a sex worker on the streets to sustain herself. Sumaya gave birth to her daughter when she was 18, and her husband left soon after. We thank God that we could help her when the local network brought her to a branch of Salvation Army that served sex works and human trafficking victims. Our partner not only provided counselling support to Sumaya, but also trained her in tailoring and crafting, through which she could sustain herself and begin anew.



Building support networks

Meanwhile, some of CEDAR's partners are fighting human trafficking along the borders of India and Nepal, and China and Myanmar via church and community networks that identify and protect vulnerable children and women in the areas, as well as supporting the migrant workers.



Nadja (pseudonym), 25, is a member of the Lahu tribe who lived in Lashio of the Shan State with her two young children and other family members. She decided to work in a tea garden in Lincang, Yunnan in China due to poverty and the lack of farming lands in Myanmar, but was unfortunately sold to a farmer family as a wife. After losing contact with their daughter for 2 months, Nadja's parents were able to contact the Lahu church in Lashio, Shan State in Myanmar and request help. She was found through the support network built between the churches on both sides of the border, and was finally reunited with her family. "If not for the church and the pastor, I'm afraid I will live in darkness for the rest of my life," said Nadja.

Serving in the Lord

CEDAR helped the victims and those who are vulnerable to human trafficking in the past ministry year through our partners in regions spanning across China, Myanmar, Thailand, Nepal, India, and Bangladesh, including:

- >Rescued 35 trafficking victims
- >Provided counselling services to 50 victims
- >Provided safe homes for 30 victims
- >Provided 208 migrant workers with information, counselling, places to live, and job referrals
- >Contacted and visited 4,609 sex workers, vulnerable children, young adults, women, and ethnic minorities and provided prevention education, rescue information, and rights education
- >Held 64 educational events in schools and communities
- >Followed up with 64 victim families
- >Retrained 126 former sex workers, vulnerable individuals, and women with vocational skills
- >Trained 200 police officers and social workers with post-trauma counselling techniques



We work hard to ensure the needs of any children among the underprivileged we serve are not overlooked. CEDAR provided multi-level support for the children experiencing various hardships in China, India, Myanmar, Bangladesh, Ethiopia, and Zimbabwe, while supporting the development of their communities for their long-term benefits.

Supporting children in the slums

Our longtime partner, World Concern Bangladesh, provides sustainable education to children in the slums by offering pre-school and grade school education, and helping street children to attend schools. At the same time, we addressed the root causes of the problem by helping the slum families to improve their financial situation. CMCT, our partner in India, is reaching its 20th year in supporting the children there. Their project is currently providing food, health, and education support for 211 children in the hope that they would escape from poverty some days. Our other partners AAGC in Ethiopia and FACT in Zimbabwe, encourage parents and guardians to attend self-help groups and to develop small business, in order to help children in poverty or those who lost their parents to AIDS to achieve self-sufficiency.

Nyasha, 23, is currently living with his elder brother and his brother's wife. His parents passed away when he was in 6th Grade and his brother had to solely care for him. They were introduced to the basic children living sponsorship programme of FACT, where Nyasha was supported through tuition sponsorship and basic essentials such as corn starch, soap, and detergent. This year, we witnessed Nyasha's graduation in his Finance degree and looked forward to seeing him living a self-sustaining life.



Our partner plans to invite Nyasha, and other beneficiaries of the programme to give back to the community in the coming years. Here they could support other children who lost their parents to AIDS and build a cycle of love. We pray that God will bless other children with the testimonies of Nyasha and others, that they would be instilled with hope and power to live out their potential.

Giving hope to migrant worker children

Kunming City of the Province Yunnan is one of the destination of a large number of migrant worker population from rural areas in China. Children who migrated with their parents are often very young and suffer from the transition from rural areas to cities. They are often being segregated because of their status, and are excluded from the local education, medical, and residential benefits due to the lack of urban citizenship. Schools are less likely to admit them, and even if the family could afford the high tuition, the children might not adapt to the different education model so easily. Busy parents lack the time to stay with their children, which aggravates the situation. There are numerous cases where children become victims of traffic accidents, drowning, and robbery each year.



CEDAR is supporting its partner in Kunming in the establishment of the Migrant Children Care Center. Migrant children, especially those not going to school, are able to learn at the center the basic skills to survive in the city such as hygiene practices and self-defense awareness. The center also provides services through its library, children's choir, and interest classes, where children could enjoy and find purposes in their lives.

Serving in the Lord

In 2015-2016, CEDAR's partner in China, Myanmar, India, Bangladesh, Ethiopia and Zimbabwe have provided integrated care for children in poverty and/or at risk, cultivating them both physically and spiritually in ways that had a lasting impact to their lives, and at the same time improving the dynamics of the families and communities that surround them. We have:

- >Financially provided 460 children with life essentials
- >Hosted life building workshops for 823 school-aged children and young adults
- >Assisted 1,212 children in fighting against human trafficking
- >Protected the rights of 700 children
- >Financially supported the operation of 31 schools and day care centers
- >Trained and equipped 117 community leaders and teachers
- >Formed 37 children's rights awareness groups
- >Hosted 157 children's rights events that drew children and teenagers and raised awareness



CEDAR understands that restoring the dignity of the underprivileged is as important as providing them their daily necessities in the fight for equality and better opportunity—such is evident in that the “A” in CEDAR means “Advocacy”.

Helping Zimbabwean regaining their rightful citizenship

The meager employment rate of

Zimbabwe has been driving its countrymen to search for opportunities in neighbouring countries. Among them was the 53 years old Sithembile, who migrated to Botswana to work and gave birth to her daughter Thembelihle there. Being born in a foreign country forced Thembelihle to go through complications in registering for her Zimbabwean citizenship, without which she could not enjoy the education and health benefits of the country. Since September last year, Thembelihle started to attend workshops held by CEDAR’s partner, Trinity Project, where she came to understand her rights as a minor and a citizen, giving a ray of hope to her situation. She conveyed the information to her parents and her father immediately contacted Trinity for help. Six weeks later, Thembelihle were finally given her birth certificate and the right to enjoy the same education and health benefits as her peers. The athletic Thembelihle is glad that she could pursue her dream as a Zimbabwean athlete for the country.



Throughout the years, Trinity has raised the awareness to children’s rights in the community and helped vulnerable children and orphans in registering their birth certificates, parents’ death certificates, and their registration in inheriting any properties left by their parents. It has also helped the poor and widowed to inherit their family heritage while preventing them from being forcefully acquired. Trinity’s project expanded to rural areas in Umguza in 10/2015, reaching out to even more people in need of legal and administrative support.

Purging derogatory customs against women

Our partner, Ethiopian Kale Heywet Church Development Commission (EKHCDC), has been faithfully advocating against female genital mutilation (FGM) in Ethiopia. They have founded 52 Anti Female Genital Mutilation (AFGM) groups that equipped young Ethiopians to become ambassadors advocating against this demeaning tradition in their schools and churches. EKHC-DC also mobilized church leaders and teachers to educate the congregation and public about FGM and the biblical view of women. The project has experienced great success this ministry year where the public opinion against FGM in the target communities has gone from 46.9% to 93.9%; the occurrence of FGM has dropped from 69.6% to 27.7%.

In 2014, Rudie joined 100 other young females in an AFGM group, where she gained more information on the practice, especially the physical and emotional turmoil it imposes on females including the increased risk of miscarriage and birth complications. Rudie has since strongly advocated against FGM to her sisters, classmates, and neighbours, telling them the consequences of FGM while reaffirming herself that she would not go through such procedure. "I wish to raise my own family without missing any part of my body. I would call the police if someone forces me to go through it," said Rudie steadfastly.

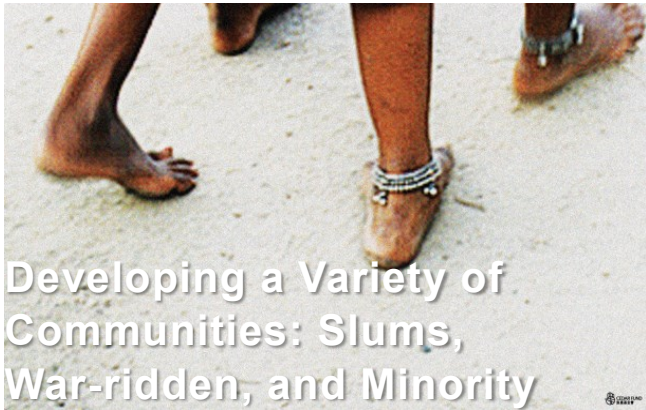
In the past ministry year, we have restored the value and dignity of the underprivileged children and women via the advocacy works of our partners in Zimbabwe, Ethiopia, and Nepal. Our efforts include:

Children's Rights Advocacy

- > Provided citizenship and heritage registration support to 269 children and 7 parents/guardians
- > Helped 15 orphans in obtaining their heritage
- > Fought for more reasonable Obstetrics & Gynecology charges for poor families

Women's Rights Advocacy

- > Trained 71 women who started to give health education training to their communities
- > Mobilized 2,972 young adults to join the AFGM task force
- > Educated 39,954 young adults about FGM and its consequences
- > Enabled 1,089 women in joining social advocacies via 36 women groups, 2 women centers, and 4 women networks
- > Taught 131 girls their rights and values via 8 girls and children groups



Developing a Variety of Communities: Slums, War-ridden, and Minority

rights that came with legal citizenship.

The Palaung Tribe living in the northern mountain range of Thailand are immigrants from Myanmar since many years ago. They often could not obtain legal citizenships and could not enjoy basic rights such as land ownership, hence they had to move from places to places frequently.

Our partner, Upland Holistic Development Programme (UHDP), empowers the Palaungs by teaching them to grow vegetables and raise pigs, catfish, and frogs in their backyards, where the Palaungs could become self-sufficient in daily food supply, in order to save money for life quality improvements. At the same time, UHDP promotes health in the community and builds restrooms and water tanks; it also trains villagers to become community development ambassadors who could demonstrate and support the development of other villages.

Lighting the candle in darkness

According to the statistics published by the United Nations Human Settlements Programme in 2014, one fourth of the entire urban population in the world struggle daily in the slum areas. In addition to getting meager wages and experiencing daily oppressions, the slum residents are frequent victims of dirty water, unhygienic environments, and structurally unsound homes.



While each community has its unique development roadmap, some of them have not become as generous to their residents as one would like to due to the community's own history, policies, and environment.

Regaining an identity

Although one could physically live in a country, he/she could hardly survive without possessing the basic benefits and civil

Their main income came from their oldest son who scavenges from day to night. Her family lived in hopelessness until being referred to our partner in India, SPTWD, where her son is given education, vocational training, leadership training, and

spiritual mentorship opportunities. We are thankful that we could cast a ray of hope in Sarah's family in their time of need.

Restoring the homes for orphans of war

Myanmar has experienced civil wars for more than 50 years in its recent history, where a massive number of children have lost their homes or even orphaned due to war and natural disasters. In the past 20 years, our partner, Fullmoon Ministry, has been faithfully taking care of the Myanmar children and mending their wounds. God opened a serving channel for us in recent years through Fullmoon, where we could support the graduates of the children homes of Fullmoon in their returning to their hometown, where they would help the post-war restoring efforts via education, health, and agricultural means.



This year in February, the members of CEDAR's exposure trip visited the Mon State and came to know Ah Wah (obscured), whose father was murdered by the armed groups of the Karen tribe when he was young, leaving his mother and him behind. When he was 7, his mother sent him to Fullmoon's children home, where he grew and graduated a few years ago. He went back to his village to join its restoration as a nurse; he was even given the chance to forgive the man who killed his father and joined forces with him to bring peace back to the village.

In the second half of 2016, we are going to build clinics in Mon State with Fullmoon, and we are hopeful that they could start providing basic healthcare and Obstetrics and Gynecology services to the villagers starting next year.

Serving in the Lord

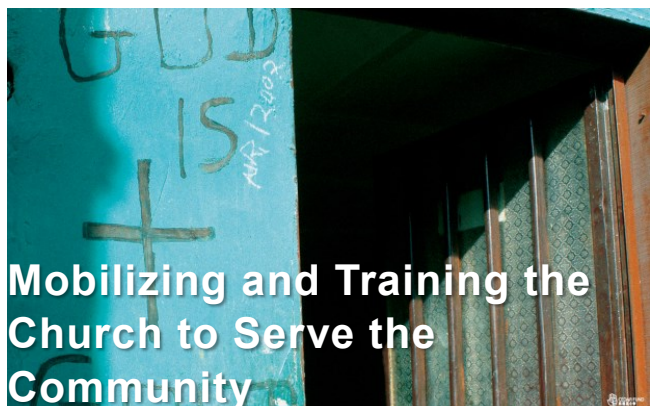
We praise Him for the opportunities in the past year to serve different communities:

In the slums of India and Bangladesh

- > Improved the living conditions of 5,181 slum residents
- > Among the minority groups in Northern Thailand and China boarders
- > Improved water supply and hygiene facilities for 1,176 villagers
- > Improved the health of 1,143 residents

In the rebuilding communities of Myanmar post-war

- > Built 1 school
- > Financially supported the rebuilding of 10 widowed/ orphaned families
- > Supporting 15 trained young professionals in fields such as education, health, and agriculture to help the rebuilding efforts
- > Helped 250 students to return to school
- > Trained 5 young adults on vocational skills
- > Provided vocational training and small loans to 50 women



Mobilizing and Training the Church to Serve the Community

To fight poverty “From church, Through church” has been our motto since our establishment 25 years ago. On top of expanding our development projects with local Christian churches and organizations, we recently began to focus on mobilizing and training of churches in responding to their surrounding communities.

Learning from the Bible

We support our partners in Myanmar and Bangladesh in providing training for churches through regular experience exchange, bible study, and prayers, in the hope that the local Christian bodies would actively support its community and respond to its needs.

Garo Baptist Convention (GBC) is one of the organizations that received our support. In 2014, our partner, Tearfund Bangladesh, supported GBC in training 8 churches in 2 poor areas inhabited by the Garo tribe. We are thankful that after 2 years of training, some of the churches did start to respond to the needs of their communities. A church utilized its own backyard for farming, while another church repaired roads and river banks that were destroyed by floods.



It is our hope that the church could exhibit itself as an important member of the community that gathers and mobilizes resources for its development. We will continue to encourage more churches around the globe to serve their communities in the coming years.

Training Seminary Students

We are supporting the United Mission to Nepal (UMN) in Nepal in the writing and publishing of texts, in the hope of equipping the students and pastors of local seminaries and training centers with the Integral Mission.

Dedgaun Atmiki Church is a church in an obscure part of Nepal. The villagers were reluctant to let the church join any community events; the church was defensive and did not involve in those events either. Our partner promoted the idea of Integral Mission and the importance of loving one another and stewardship in the church through bible study, and the church started to bring down their guard and commit to love their neighbours and their environment despite any hostility. They started to build a better relationship with the

villagers and improved their utilization of their water source. When the church fulfils its responsibility as a part of the society, their change in attitude has brought the change in the relationship between the villagers and the church, where they started to trust each other again.

Serving in the Lord

We have achieved the following in training Christians in China, Bangladesh, Nepal, and Myanmar this ministry year.

- > Trained over 300 pastors and leaders in focusing on serving the community
- > Mobilized 535 local churches to care for their respective communities
- > Aided 8 seminars in opening Integral Mission classes that equipped 105 students

member, the MEDAIR, in providing housing, clean water, and hygiene support to 26,262 refugees (a total of 4,377 families) that mainly consists of elderly, people with disabilities, and women.

We supported another member of IA, the Mission East, that provides drinking water and hygiene supplies for the refugees within the Iraq border. We also supported the victims of the civil war through our partner with education and counselling services.

Disaster risk reduction

Besides disaster relief, we have projects that develop disaster management and risk reduction efforts in areas that are prone to disasters, in order to prepare the people under poverty to better respond to any disaster occurrences. We have seen the measures coming to effect in the India floods this year.

We have been supporting EFICOR in their Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR) project that teaches disaster response techniques and raise risk awareness among the villagers in Bihar, Northern India. They have developed disaster prevention and escape plans and regularly rehearsed them with the villagers, which successfully reduced the damage of the floods that hit multiple South Asian countries in June 2016. Some DRR participants even went to other affected areas to help with the relief efforts.

In 2015-2016, we were busy supporting the members of the Integral Alliance (IA) in their relief efforts for the Nepal earthquake and the Middle East refugee crisis.

Disaster relief

400,000 Syria refugees are currently living in extremely poor conditions in the Bekaa Valley of Lebanon. Last year, CEDAR and other members of the IA supported another

In 2015-2016, we served with overseas partners and members of IA and provided disaster relief and humanitarian intervention for multiple regions in Asia and Africa, while developing prevention programmes in India and Bangladesh:

- > Provided emergency relief for 7,969 families
- > Provided shelter for 5,099 families
- > Provided food for 79,299 refugees
- > Provided humanitarian support for 5,827 refugee families
- > Improved the disaster risk reduction ability of 41,255 villagers in 76 disaster-prone villages

Local Ministry



CEDAR networks with both overseas and Hong Kong churches in the hope that Christians and the younger generation could broaden their perspectives and meet the poor through the church, where we could experience God's work in the underprivileged and discover His calling for us.

CEDAR regularly shares its experiences at churches, schools, seminaries, or through

the CEDAR Club platform. We present the communities in need to the loving Christians where they could see God's will among the poor.



Last year, besides the regular CEDAR Barefoot walk where participants would get a taste of poverty, we have also partnered with the Crossroads Foundation twice in hosting slums experiencing events, where participants could get a sense of what it is like to live in the slums through staged scenes, and how should they respond.

Furthermore, nothing is as eye-opening as actually going into the poverty communities and getting the first-hand experience of both the brokenness of the world and God's work in it through CEDAR and its partners. This February, CEDAR brought 10 of its supports to visit the project sites in Myanmar, including Fullmoon's children home which houses war and disaster-affected children and orphans, the communities in Mon state during their restoration after the civil war, the agricultural training and development sites, and the local women and girls who had been trafficked. The group members were passionate in sharing what they saw, heard, and thought during their trip in Myanmar after they were back home, encouraging the churches and Christians in Hong Kong with testimonies of God's reconciliation work in Myanmar, that urged us to continue to support the people there.



Review and Prospect

“As you go, proclaim this message: ‘The kingdom of heaven has come near.’ Heal the sick, raise the dead, cleanse those who have leprosy, drive out demons... And if anyone gives even a cup of cold water to one of these little ones who is my disciple, truly I tell you, that person will certainly not lose their reward” (Matthew 10: 7-8, 42)

This is the command given to the twelve disciples when the Lord sent them. As the kingdom of heaven came yet closer in 2015-16 in the form of both man-made and natural chaos, CEDAR was carrying out the Lord's will with all its might while we mobilized churches and Christian groups to try to give cups of cold water to those in need.

In the past year, we continued to grow our developmental projects in six countries of our focus. Our work has reached a vastly diverse group of ethnic minorities, children in poverty, AIDS victims, drug addicts, slums residents, etc. Culturally we strongly advocated against derogatory traditions such as child marriage and female genital mutilation, while equipping churches with ideas of the Integral Mission. Most notably, we were able to step up our involvement in the fight against human trafficking where we supported a partner which engages in legal investigation and prosecution of offenders in addition to our usual prevention education and rescue efforts. This window has never been opened to us before and we are actively searching for more confirmation to see if God has an even bigger assignment for CEDAR. Please pray for us!

Furthermore, CEDAR partnered with the members of the Integral Alliance and provided for those who were devastated by natural disasters around the world this year. Through the love of God, we also helped those who lived under constant fear caused by wars. The number of victims who needed our support massively exceeded our capacity, but that would only drive us to find more ways to help them and raise awareness in the coming years—which we could never achieve without your help.

After serving for the past 11 years, Dr. Chan Nim Chung retired from his post as CEDAR's Chief Executive and became one of our Board Members starting from March this year. We cannot thank Dr. Chan enough for his contribution in the past decade that brought CEDAR to where it is today. The leadership change slightly postponed the kickoff of the 3-year plan to the year of 2017-18, but we will continue our work faithfully to fight poverty “From church, Through church” as always.

All in all, we can firmly say that we were exceptionally blessed by God and you in 2015-16, and it is our hope that we could continue our walk with the poor and witness even more of His faithfulness in the coming year.
